Led by the best defensive team in many years, Hart's Varsity Indians ended the football season with an excellent record of 6 wins and 3 losses in the recently-formed Marmonte League. Membership in the Marmonte League gave Hart High AAA status for the first time. The competition was tougher; we didn't take the championship but acquitted ourselves honorably anyway.

Throughout the season the defense was the all important factor in Hart's victories. Only 3 times did the team falter, and those 3 losses cost the games-the only 3 losses of the season. The great defense, under the leadership of Mike Smith, in nine games allowed only 45 points to its opponents,
an average of 5.0 points per game. They held their opponents to 543 passing yards and 640 rushing yards.
This year's offense, scoring 120 points during their nine games, with Ron Stewart as the leading scorer, also did their part for the Varsity team.
