

Friendship is the sky when the storm clouds separate to reveal a glorious blue —


the sky when misunderstandings clear up and the friendship is strengthened to form a stronger bond.






Scared Saracins ran for the locker










Practice, teamwork, power,


and more practice are the keys to a successful football season. Although the 1973 season was not a winning one for the Indians, they did make a good showing for their first year in the strong Foothill League.

Pigskinners exhibited strength










Wet and wild practices were held



















Grappling their way to an 8 win, 2 loss







With the great amount of experience gained by the girls on the Varsity and J.V. teams who are returning next year, a fantastic season is looked forward to.




440, 880, 50 100, mile, and relays

A season marked by numerous wins found several Indians making it to the CIF playoffs. They included John McKinzey, Phil Muhl, and Tom Cusick.


























Clobbered Canyon Cowboys stood in awe as






Smashing victory of 40-2 ended the season















A whirlwind of glamour and harmony







Under the capable direction of Mr. Larry Thornton and Mr. Robert Babko, a program of varied styles of music was put together for the listening pleasure of all who attended.


In an area somewhat removed from the major entertainment centers of Los Angeles, events of this sort are looked forward to by the community as well as the staff and students.








from the audience when Hartburns '74 found its way onto the Hart stage.


Ballads, popular songs, and original medleys





















Anxiety, tears, apprehension, and pride







With the help of sophomore officers, it was made possible, for the first time in Hart's history, for the sophomores to purchase their class rings during their first year at Hart.
























Working for new facilities and developing






For college-bound students, courses in chemistry, biology, and physics were offered. A large percentage of the students enrolled in science courses took Drivers Education and Health.






Freezing bodies emerged
















Familiarizing foreign cultures






Get what you pay for, watch what you buy,


















Ardent, zealous, energetic, and hearty


Mrs. Pat Cheek again advised both groups and, with the help of co-captains Sue See and Cindi Weaver, saw them achieve a high standard of performance.





















Underground plans for secret events








Joyful singing of exquisite music, old










Deadlines, copy, color, picas, and hard work


where among the 300 plus items buried in the Hart High time capsule on June 1, 1974 at noon at the Santa Clarita Valley Civic Center. Inspired by a similar project at Montebello High School, students in Ms. Rochelle Thomas' sociology classes decided to preserve part of the present for the future. The idea snowballed into reality as the burial day neared.

The initial problem of a container was solved with the donation of a casket by Eternal Valley Mortuary. Next came the gathering of items typical of today. Students, teachers, and other interested persons were given the opportunity to contribute to the capsule's contents. A wide variety of items were collected, including: magazines, newspapers, catalogues, pennies, pictures, clothing, report cards, birth control pills, a marijuana leaf encased in resin, and student letters.

Help with the project came from many quarters. Mr. Dean Roland, Social Studies Department chairman; Mr. Dan Hanigan, principal; and Supervisor Baxter Ward were responsible for granting the necessary project approval. Mr. Paul Shepard from the Southern California Gas Company provided information and assistance in the prevention of corrosion. Mr. Robert Wuerfel provided transportation for the casket. Mr. Milton Campbell sealed the coffin with silicone provided by National Auto Glass. Finishing touches of a floral spray and tombstone were donated by Rambling Rose Florist and Eternal Valley Mortuary, respectively.

On June 1, 2000 the capsule will be opened. A program from the burial ceremonies will entitle the bearer to an item from the capsule.
