Hours are 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. each day at 27921 Urbandale, Saugus. The public is invited. A tour and refreshments will be offered to all visitors. The open house is to celebrate the Center's tenth anniversary.

Special Education came to the Santa Clarita Valley in the mid 60-s. The Los Angeles County Superintendent of Schools arranged with Santa Clarita Methodist Church on Bouquet Canyon to use one of their classrooms to hold classes for eight Trainable Mentally Retarded young persons.

Ozella McDaniels was the first teacher, and within a year over 20 students were served in two classrooms. An expanding need resulted in Emblem Special School just behind the church on Espuella Drive.

Students 18 years and over could not remain in the school system unless they also attended a sheltered workshop two hours per day. Community interest resulted in a packed room for a dinner meeting of friends and parents at the church.

First drafts of bylaws were drawn by Attorney Jim Lowder and by December 30, 1969 the incorporation of Pleasant-view Achievement Center—a non-profit sheltered workshop/activity center was complete.

A Board of Directors consisted of Arlen Hansen, Jess Reddington, Lavender Gilliland, Jacki Storinsky, Jereann Bowman, Harold Sturza, Roy Kessinger, Jim Pugh and Chairman Olive Ruby. They began to plan, establish, and operate facilities for physically, emotionally and /or mentally retarded adults '(the new term is developmentally disabled.); needing such service to achieve their fullest usefulness to themselves and the community.

Dr. Foster and the Saugus and School Board offered a building (rent free) on their District Offices grounds. On October 13, 1970 the Center opened with 13 clients from Emblem Special School.

Ann Elliott and Arline Sigsbury as supervisors, and Arleta Burgher as secretary, helped the workers with subcontracts such as assembling sets of plastic ware and salt and pepper packages for airlines and the assembly and bagging of oxygen masks.

Clients always are paid for their work in proportion to that expected of a normal worker. Checks are issued twice a month. Other contracts have included assembly and packaging of light fixtures, collating, folding, assembly and mailing for many organization including clubs, schools, PTA's and churches, much of the mailing donated time as a community service for the Center feels it is a part of the community. As many as 38 clients were served for two hours a day, tuition for some paid by their parents.

By the fall of 1977 the Center had \$35,000 in savings, Gerry Howard was hired as director, and with three supervisors, the work day was lengthened to 9 a m to 4 n m for 40 clients.

a.m. to 4 p.m. for 40 clients. In 1979 developers Nigro and Saad bought the old Saugus School property and donated the kindergarten building to Pleasantview if they would remove it from the grounds.

Jess Reddington, shop chairman for the Center and member of the Saugus Elementary School Board, realized that ground on the Rosedell School grounds, along the creek, was not needed. Thanks again to Dr. Foster and the school board the center found a home:

With their savings and the many contributions of cash and labor of such as the Lions Club, Zonta, Soroptomists, HMNMH Buck-a-month Club, Vallery Federal Savings & Loan, Prudential Savings & Loan, Home Savings & Keysor-Century, Loan. Republican Women, Newhall Women's Club, Hydraulic Research, Foxboro, John Kelley & helpers from Pacific Telephone, Rotary, Kiwanis, Sun Production, many many cement & block firms, Rentall, lumber companies etc, and individuals . . . the building is moved and sufficiently reconditioned for use by the shop.

Contracts have been expanded to include cutting and packing film, heat sealing, etc. The activity center produces bead, hooked rug and painted items for sale.

Staff member Janice Kimbrel teaches money recognition, telling of time, learning traffic signals, reading and writing via the Laubach method.

Bowling on Friday afternoons, and attending Dodger games, Magic Mountain, dances and such provide social life and communication with the community. As a member of the Santa Clarita Valley Chamber of Commerce, they process the mailing of their bulletins.

Their new home is not finished but they are on their way, thanks to a generous community. The Board of Directors - Rocco Cacciatore, chairman; Jess Reddington, shop chairman; Tonia Henson Olive Ruby, Treasurer. Secretary; Bob Routolo, Jim Pugh, Jim Fortuno, Arlen Hansen and Eilene Graziano, Gerry Howard, director of the center, and the staff look forward to meeting the public.
